

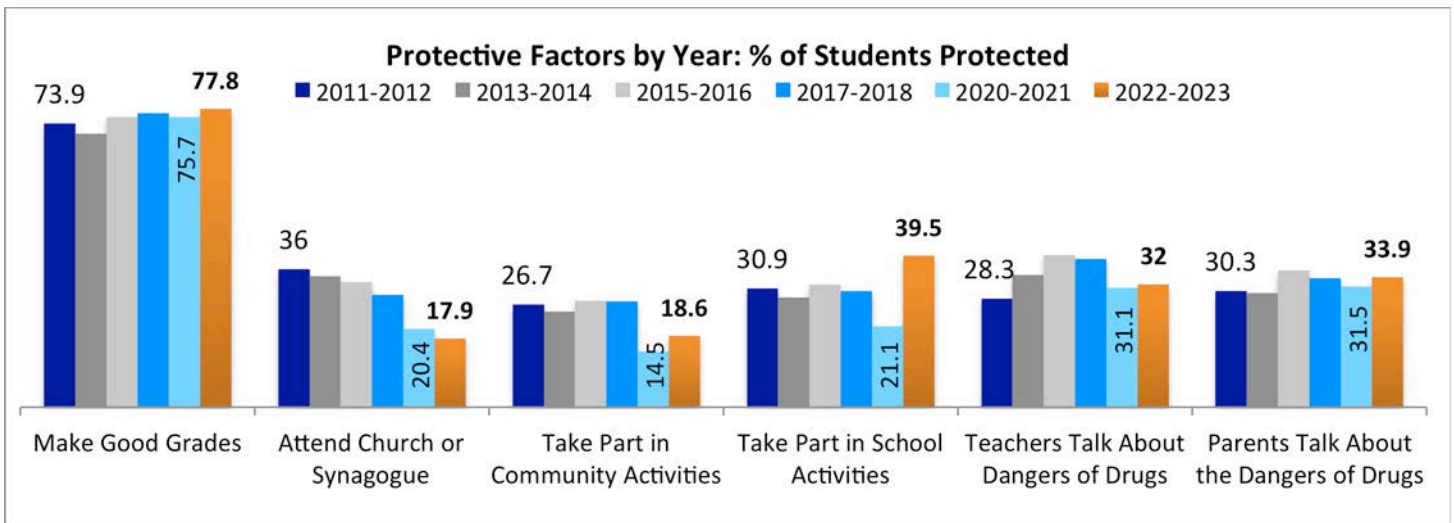


2022-2023 PRIDE Survey Report: Protective & Risk Factors Morgan County, West Virginia Grades 6th-12th grade

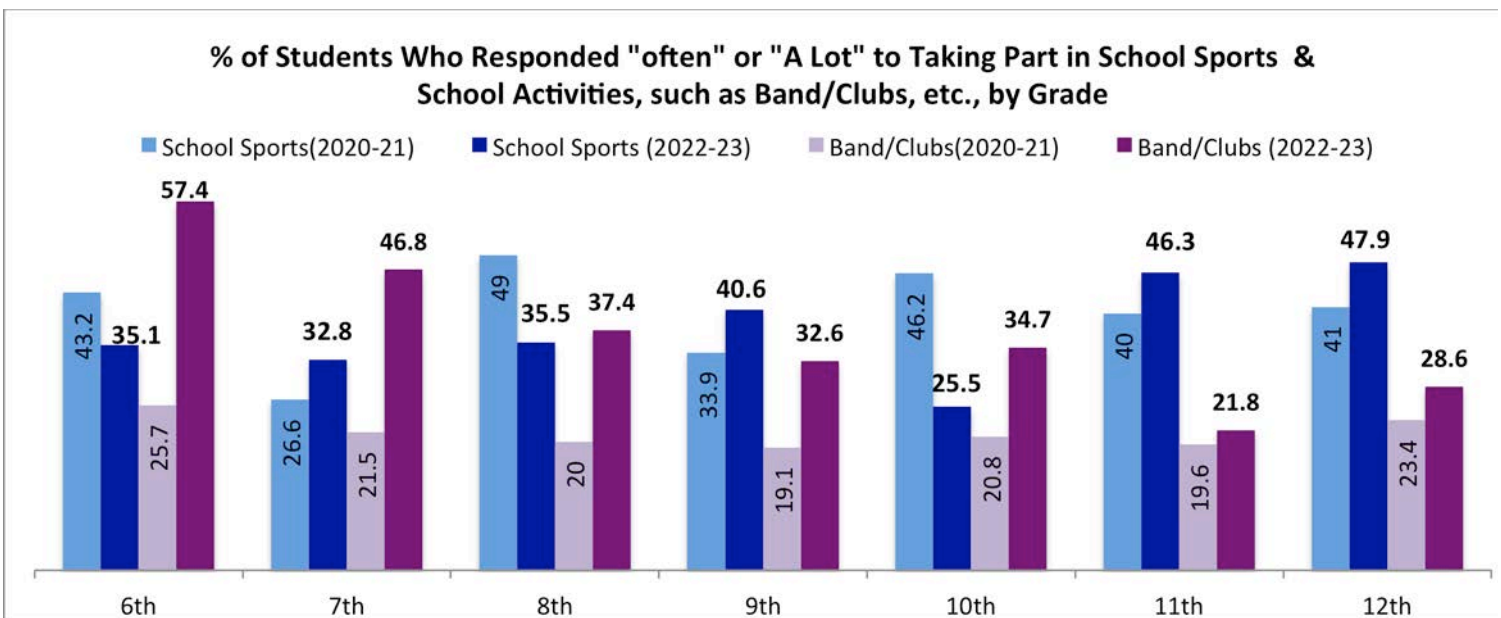
PRIDE Survey Overview:

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Morgan County Partnership and Morgan County Schools administered the PRIDE Survey to students in 6th through 12th grade at Warm Springs Middle School, Berkeley Springs High School, and Paw Paw Schools. The data reported is representative of the 6th-12th grade population of the schools and communities in Morgan County, West Virginia. A total of 618 students completed the PRIDE questionnaire.

The PRIDE Survey is a national evaluation that measures student alcohol, tobacco and other drug use. In addition, this questionnaire also gathers school climate data (on bullying, harassment, etc.) as well as risk and protective factor items. The chart below uses combined 6th - 12th grade data to show the 6 protective factors and how they have changed through the years.

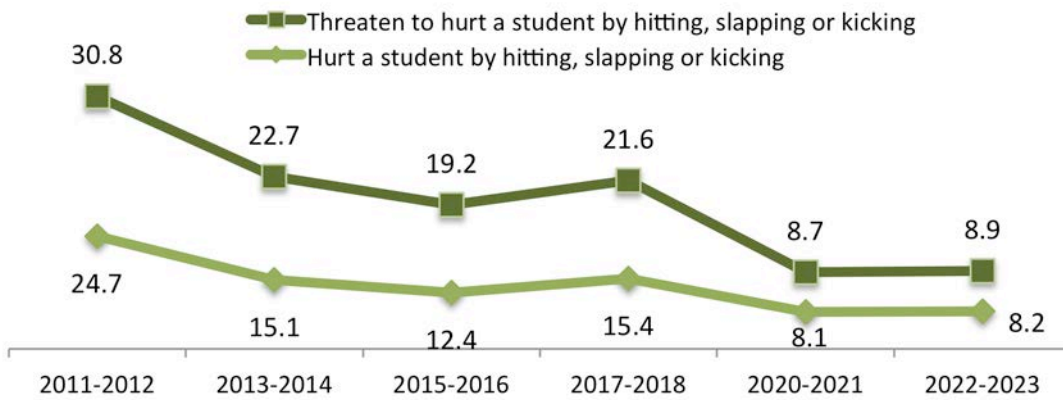


The chart below compares student responses by grade from the 2020-21 & 2022-23 PRIDE survey for two student engagement indicators, taking part in school sports teams and taking part in other school activities such as band, clubs, etc.



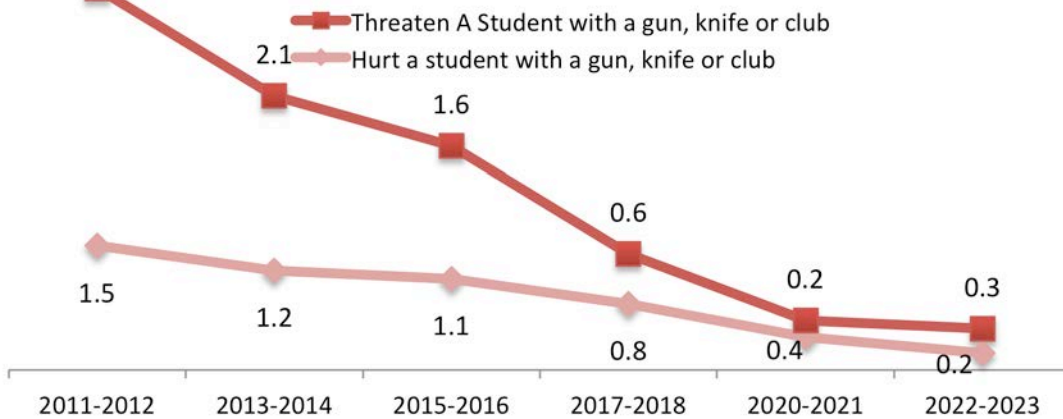
Risk Factors by Year: % Threatened Harm Vs Harmed

by hitting, slapping or kicking, 6-12th Grade



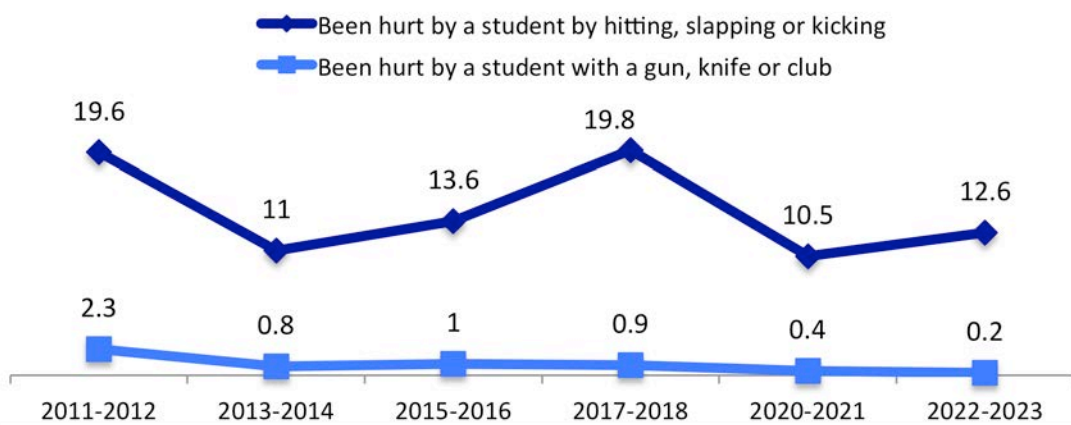
Risk Factors by Year: % Threatened Harm Vs Harmed

Key Findings:

Since 2020-2021, 5 out of 6 protective factors increased: Make Good Grades, Take Part in Community Activities & School Activities, and Teachers & Parents Talk About the Dangers of Drugs

Since 2020-2021, every grade in 6-12th grade reported increased engagement in band/clubs. Students in 6th, 8th and 10th grade reported decreased participation in sports.

Among all students in 6th-12th grades, tenth graders are the least engaged in school activities and sixth graders are the most engaged.

Between 2020-2021 & 2022-2023, the percent of students who threaten harm (8.7% to 8.9%) and actually harm (8.1% to 8.2%) remained about the same but they are slightly increasing.

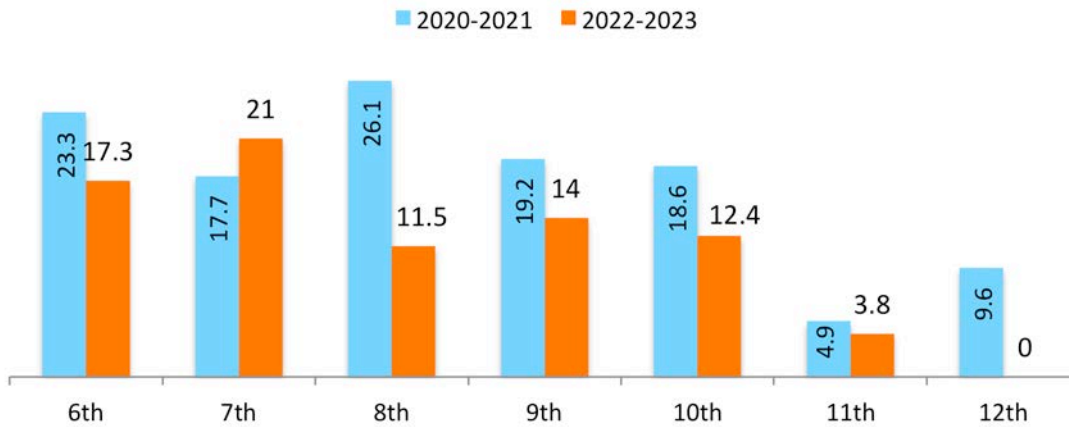
In 2022-2023, the percent of students who reported to threaten harm vs caused harm by hitting, slapping or kicking, are about the same (8.9% vs. 8.2%).

More students report being hurt by a student by hitting, slapping and kicking (12.6%) than by a gun, knife or club (.2%).



Violence Indicators by Grade

% Who Report Being Afraid That Another Student Might Hurt Them, One or More Times in the Past Year



Key Findings:

Out of all students in 6th-12th grades, seventh graders reported “being afraid of getting hurt by another student” the most (21%) and twelfth graders report it the least (0%).

The Violence Indicator, “Threatened a fellow student” decreased 22.2% since 2011-2012.

The Violence Indicator, “Being hurt at school” increased 2.1% since 2020-2021.

The Violence Indicator, “Being afraid at school” decreased 4.3% since 2020-2021.

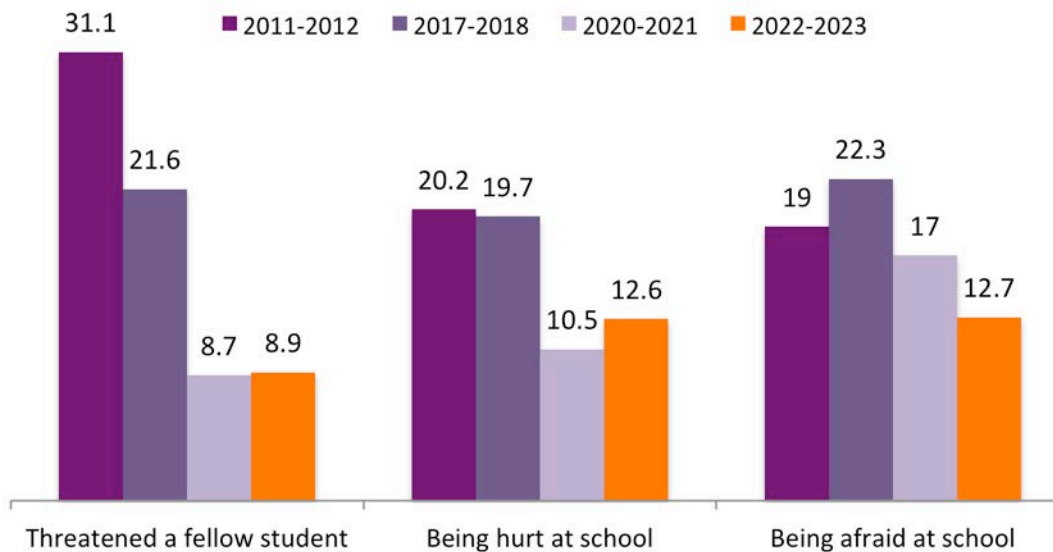
The Violence Indicator, “Getting In Trouble with Police” increased 1% since 2020-2021.

The Violence Indicator, “Participated in gangs” decreased 6.8% since 2011-2012.

The Violence Indicator, “Thought often or a lot about suicide” decreased 2.9% since 2020-2021.
